Welcome

Editors

Welcome to the (slightly) new look Chelmsford Hockey Club Newsletter, the first for the 2005/2006 Season.

Due to the Commonwealth Games being held in Melbourne during March 2006, the EHL is suspended for the the months before and the duration of the games. Of the 18 league games to be played this season, 13 of them are being played before Christmas with the rest being played upon the resumption of the EHL in April/May 2006. With this in mind the 1st XI's almost have to treat the games as two separate seasons, with pre-season fitness and warm-up matches in both August / September and March / April!

Following on from the great results last season, it was always going to be difficult to live up to expectations. The Ladies' 1st XI, despite a minor blip to start, have progressed well and are in familiar territory in the upper third of the table (now second!). The Men's 1st XI on the other hand are struggling to get started in this year's Premiership. With the departure of several key players from last season, least of all Player/Manager Craig Fulton, the Men have failed so far to recreate the excellent play that last year ensured a second season in the Premiership.

Outside of the 1st XI's the club as a whole is having mixed fortunes. The Ladies' teams are living up to their high standards but the Men's teams, following an exodus at the top end of the club, are struggling to consolidate their positions after last season's raft of promotions.

it's difficult when you play at a pitch that's not close to your opposition clubhouse, but can you please make the effort to go back after the game. Just as we do, clubs go to the expense of laying on teas and are very disappointed when the opposition do not come back. It's not good for the reputation of Chelmsford and on a personal level it's pretty discourteous. Before we had the benefit of the water based we had 7 "home" venues and both the bar take and teas suffered a lot - so I can empathise with clubs over this. So please make the effort.

Facilities

I'm very grateful to Jon Lambert who recently took over day to day responsibility for our facilities. This is a big job so its good to know that things are in safe hands.

Water based pitch

You all know that we have a had an algae problem, but the position is now beginning to improve. We have engaged Petan Associates to de-algae and clean the pitch. One treatment has been done and we are now waiting for the pitch to be power washed and given a final clean. But it is already looking much better. Peter Day who runs Petan is a hockey players himself - Reading vets - and we have been able to bring his wide experience of treating pitches across the country to sorting our problem out. It's a little more encouraging to know that its a problem shared by all water pitches and to a lesser extent sand pitches. We are joining the water based pitch users club to pool knowledge and experience so there is a genuine desire by all concerned to get this

cracked. What is clear is that keeping the pitch clean is a major factor - to that end we have invested over £3,500 on a mechanised brush. Over time, with self help, this will save us a lot of money.

What can you do to help?? Aside from volunteers to be trained to clean the pitch (very grateful to those who have stepped forward so far), the biggest thing you can do is to stick to the paths when walking to the pitch and ensuring that your opposition do too. Set an example and they will follow - and don't be slow to ask people to follow your example. Mud, grass and other debris walked onto the pitch helps provide the environment in which algae thrives. Following this simple advice is a good way to keep subs down next year.

We are also helping to keep our costs down by hiring out the pitch. From the start of the financial year we have generated income of around £11,000 all of which is ringfenced for pitch maintenance and replacement. If you know of anyone who would like to hire the pitch please let me know.

If achieved, it will bring much needed revenue to the Club and help maintain not only the on-field successes, but also the fantastic facilities that we enjoy at Chelmer Park these days.

Every member can do their bit to help, in two distinct ways. You can, like some people have already, put your hand in your pocket to support a player or, alternatively, a group, a family or a team can do likewise. Similarly, finding and introducing a sponsor from outside the Club will achieve the same goal and all the information you need is available in a leaflet from me, via a simple e-mail or phone call. The Bar Stewards are aware that some teams have a high number of under 18's who obviously cannot go behind the bar, but there will be other players around in the clubhouse that might be able to help. Please ask. Under 18's in each team should be tasked with tidying up and bringing in glasses for washing up.

The **unpaid** Bar Stewards are not barmen, so please do not presume we will be behind the bar to serve you. We spend 3-4 hours a week each making sure the bar is up

and running properly, and we do not like being taken for granted that will be behind the bar serving all and sundry. We are club members who like to socialise with our opposition after games.

- When you have finished your tea, organise a rota for the bar.
- Keep the bar tidy and the glasses washed up.
- Bring glasses in from around the clubhouse.
- Put any rubbish in the bin, and clean ashtrays.

Facilities

Believe it or not, the new facilities have now been up and running for a couple of years. The new changing rooms were first used for the England vs Japan match in November 2003.

Probably the most obvious problem we’ve had is with the algae on the water-based pitch. Previous cleaning attempts provided only a brief respite before we returned to playing on a mucky and smelly pitch. Following discussion with other clubs and other research we have contracted Petan Associates to treat and clean the pitch, hopefully you will have seen the difference already. The algaecide is safe for human/animal contact and will not damage the pitch. Weather permitting; the process should be complete by the end of November. We then need your

help to try and prevent the problem recurring:

- Please avoid walking across the grass to get to the pitch and ask your opposition to do the same. We know that it is the shortest route, but it is exacerbating the problem.
- Please try and avoid putting too much water on the pitch. If water is required, only use the reduced cycle (2). This will be sufficient for the winter months.

We have purchased a machine to clean the pitch on a weekly basis and are looking for volunteers to join a small team. The machine looks like a small sit-on lawnmower and will take 1.5-2 hours to do the pitch. If you are interested in helping, please contact Spencer or myself. We’re looking for 5-6 people to spread the load.

If you’ve watched a 1st XI match at Chelmer Park in the last few weeks, you may well have bought a cup of tea or coffee from Nikki and Tufty. The experiment running the stall has been a great success and our long-term aim is to put up a tea shed on the tarmac near the pump-house. If you (or someone you know) may be able to help with the provision of a suitable shed, please let me know.

Things are also happening around the clubhouse extension, although I’m sure that many people won’t notice! We should soon have some lighting along the path outside which anyone who has tried leaving in the dark will appreciate. Inside, we’re trying to slowly clear out and sort the different rooms. Next on the list is the meeting room where we are also taking delivery of some

After such a great end to last season it was always going to be a tough 'ask' to reproduce the same performances and results this season. It has proved just that, though.

The 1st XI are struggling, they are yet to find their stride and have only managed a couple of draws in their first 10 games.

There has seemingly been an exodus of players over the summer and at the beginning of this season, unfortunately (for the club) and fortunately (for some players) this has meant that some people are now playing a team above (and sometimes 2/3 leagues above) where they were playing last season. 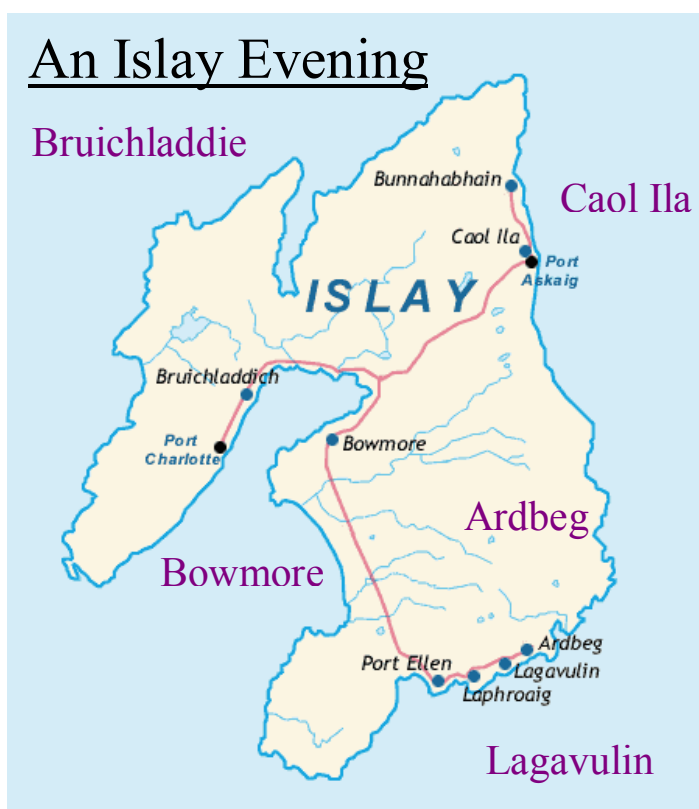
